## **Congresbury Community Library**

The summer holidays are here so that means the annual Summer Reading Challenge has started in your local library! This runs until the middle of September and the challenge, for any child between the ages of 0 and 11, is to visit the library on 4 occasions and read a minimum of 6 books. During the visits they collect stickers and receive a certificate and medal when they have completed the challenge. Research indicates that reading levels can decline during the summer holidays, a phenomenon often referred to as the "summer slide". This decline is more pronounced in children who do not engage in regular reading activities over the break. Some studies even suggest that students can lose up to two months of reading skills during the summer. Participating in the Challenge helps to ensure this does not happen to your child.

We have a number of activities for children throughout the holiday linked to the Reading Challenge theme of the Story Garden. On

Wednesday 13 August from 10 am to 12 noon we are holding an art session. Plus a range of activities that villagers eager to buy, outstanding can be carried out at home in your garden or in the local environment. Details of these can be obtained from the library and they are all FREE and require a minimum of materials.

Our volunteers look forward to welcoming you and your child/ren into the library and helping them find great books to read.

There is no knit club in August but it will return on Friday 19 September. Also in September we start our next series of evening events with an illustrated talk by Sir David Eastwood on Edward Elgar: Explaining the **Enigma of England's Greatest** Composer. This is on Thursday 25 September at 7:30 pm in the Methodist Hall, Congresbury, BS49 5JA. Tickets are still only £4, available from the library or on the night.

On one of the hottest days of the year, the shady areas under the trees in St. Andrew's Church paddock were sought after, while the volunteers sweltered in the sun. The Flower Show attracted 403 entries, with 87 classes covering fruit, vegetables, flowers, cooking, handicrafts, art and photography. Blackcurrants proved the most popular fruit, with Jane Hares top of the 11 entries but the rare fruit was apricots, grown by Marion Johnson. John Chaplin beat the competition with his flowers and pot plants. Jacqui Coulson, Treasurer of the Gardening Club, proved the Queen of the Show, taking home five trophies for her roses, sweet peas and horticultural entries. Other trophies were won by people too many to name here. Children's awards were given to Martha Edwards, Lucy Parry and Rachel Darvill.

# **Update from Tessa Munt MP for Congresbury**

David and I had a lovely afternoon at the Village Fete and Summer Show.

What a fantastic event - we really enjoyed meeting so many of you! Thank you to all the organisers.

In Parliament, I've spoken in a debate on speeding and traffic. I know this affects many locals and I'll continue to work with you, the Police, North Somerset Council and press the Government to enable stronger preventative action. Thank you if you've contacted me about this.

I also pressed the Health Secretary to ensure the new Cancer Plan improves access to radiotherapy. NHS England hasn't improved the availability of radiotherapy over the last decade, meaning many local cancer patients have to travel well over an hour for treatment.

Thank you to everyone who has come to meet me - I'll be holding local 'surgeries' during the summer: Friday 1st August and Friday 5th September from 10 to 11am at The Market Kitchen Café, Churchill Friday 8th August and Friday 26th September from 10 to 11am at Congresbury Community Café Friday 15th August and Friday 19th September from 9 to 10 am at That Coffee Place, Yatton No appointment is necessary - it's first come, first served. If you can't come to meet me, I'll come to see you.
