# Snippets from your Ward Councillor

While our thoughts may be on seasonal things, our views are being sought on very important plans for the

future of our area. The West of England Joint Spatial Plan indicates large scale developments around Nailsea and Backwell and two totally new villages, one north of Banwell and one north-west of Churchill. The 'new Churchill' development envisages a 2,800 dwellings settlement (twice the size of Congresbury) stretching from the Mendip Springs Golf Course to Sandford with a new main road connecting the A371 and the A38. The North Somerset Executive decided to prefer this strategic development to building around the new South Bristol Ring Road. Although that site would be nearer employment and transport links to Bristol, it is designated as Green Belt. Other local authorities were prepared to 'redraw' their Green Belt, but not our Executive. We do need to build more houses, but it is important that we should all make our views known about what we consider to be the right sustainable locations. Representations can be made on the West of England website: www.jointplanningwofe.org.uk before 10th January. At the same time North Somerset Council are consulting about their new Local Plan (2018-2036), which will be based on the Joint Spatial Plan. Details are on the North Somerset website. Look for: My Council > Get Involved > Consultations > North Somerset Local Plan 2036.

We should also find time to look at the latest expansion plans of **Bristol Airport**, which envisages an increase in annual passenger numbers from 8m to 20m by 2040 with much more parking and possibly a second terminal building (all in the Green Belt). To view the various possible scenarios go to <u>www.bristolairportfuture.com</u> and respond under 'Have your say'. This consultation runs to the 26<sup>th</sup> January.

Both these plans will eventually go to government Inspectors before they can be approved, so it is really important that public views are expressed.

## **Bristol Airport Expansion**

You will have seen in the local press that Bristol Airport is 60 years old and looking towards the future. This includes increasing its facilities to cope with 12 million passengers by 2025, rising to 19 million by 2045. To cope with the higher number of passengers the airport is looking at extending the terminal, possibly building another runway and improving the public transport access to the site.



This will have an impact on our community. There will be more takeoffs and landings with its resulting noise and visual pollution and the traffic accessing the airport via the A370 will increase.

The Airport is holding a number of drop-in sessions around the area where you can find out more about their plans and give your feedback.

Congresbury Parish Council is not a member of the Airport Consultative Committee as it is not seen as having a particular role and interest as the airport is not located in our parish. The fact that the flight path passes directly over part of the parish does not seem to count.

To counter this view the Parish Council would like to start logging resident's observations concerning aircraft noise and movements during the day and night. 

# Advance Warning Sheep Grazing on Cadbury Hill

### **Dear Dog Walkers**

The Cadbury Hill Management Group has decided that for a limited period this winter a flock of approximately 50 sheep will be grazing on the topmost part of the hill.

Grazing animals are an integral part of the management of the limestone grassland and have contributed enormously not just to the improvement in the biodiversity of the plant life on the hill but also in protecting the sensitive archaeology which can be badly damaged by roots etc.

Congresbury and Yatton Parish Councils will ensure that plenty of advanced notice at all entrances to the hill, including at the Henley Lane car parks and on the PC's websites so that you and your dogs are not taken by surprise by the arrival of the sheep.

During this period we hope that you will keep your pets on their leads when on the hill top, however the lower slopes and surrounding fields, which are owned by NSC, will continue to be restriction free.

# **Reducing Food Waste**

Congresbury Parish Council is supporting North Somerset Council in its drive to reduce waste throughout the county.

With the help of residents North Somerset has achieved a recycling rate of 60%. However, about half of the rubbish thrown into black bins could have been recycled which would save money and help the environment. The cost of waste disposal to landfill is £105/tonne.

One way in which this could be improved is by reducing the amount of household food waste. The Love Food Hate Waste campaign estimates that the average family throws away £70 of food per month! That's £840 per year which could be put towards a holiday or other treats.

Here are a few suggestions from the campaign that can be used to reduce food waste and save money:

- Write a shopping list before going to the shops, to make sure you only buy what is needed
- Take your own plastic boxes to deli counters and restaurants, both to reduce your plastic foot-print, and capture leftovers
- Use leftovers or freeze them to make quick and easy meals
- Keep your freezer fully stocked so that it runs more efficiently
- Remember, food can be frozen up to and including its 'use by date'

# Old School Rooms Improvements

After many months of deliberations and research the Parish Council is pleased to report that the improvements to the St Andrew's Room have been started and are expected to be completed before the end of January. The room has always been a popular venue for village meetings but was in need of modernisation.

New lights are being installed plus an overhead projector, a retractable screen, a hearing loop, plus additional sockets for plugging in computers etc. Also, the ventilation will be improved and room redecorated.

Chairs and tables which are currently situated around the building will be relocated to a new storage area in the lobby which will increase the usable space within the halls.



The main Jubilee Hall is also being improved with the introduction of a hearing loop and a PA system with speakers placed around the room.

The railings on the outside of the building have also had a facelift and been renovated and re painted.

The refurbished St Andrew's Room will be an ideal facility for meetings, training opportunities and workshops. If you are involved with

It has been 6 months since Congresbury Parish Council and local volunteers took over running the village library. This hasn't been without a few hiccups along the way, but together with hard work and determination from the volunteers and support from the community we have made significant progress in establishing a facility the village can be proud of.

Congresbury Community Library now has its own website Congresbury-Library.org.uk where you will find information about opening times, forthcoming events and any developments planned for the library. We also have bookmarkers that provide all contact information phone, email and website, so please pick one up when you're next in the library.

We have recently increased our book stock by establishing an 'Honesty Library' of about 500 books, mainly donated by local residents, which fill new bookcases as you enter the library. Anyone can borrow any number of books for any period of time. All we ask is that you return them so others may benefit from the expanded selection. We have a substantial number of additional books for the Honesty Library which will ensure the choice of books is refreshed regularly.

The library will be redecorated this year. This will mean that the library will be closed for a week from the 18th of February to the 25th.
