Snippets from your Ward Councillor

The recent rise in Council Tax will have been an unpleasant surprise to residents struggling with rising costs.

The poorest experienced the largest percentage increase, widening inequality in our district. At the same time, the Council's overall funding is reducing, resulting in cuts in services for both vulnerable adults and children. Cross-party representations by the Local Government Association have been ignored by government. Cash-strapped councils are looking at all means of generating income, including rent from property deals. There is more and more reliance on what local communities can do for themselves. Congresbury stands out as a place where we give time and resources for things we value like our environment, public open spaces, our library, community meeting places, youth organisations, clubs and support for elderly citizens. All of these rely on local funds and volunteers.

We are considering plans for the next 15-20 years for the West of England region, for the district and for our village. The Joint Spatial Plan, the North Somerset Local Plan and the Congresbury Neighbourhood Plan are all interlinked, together with plans for new infrastructure and airport expansion. Health and social care provision is also changing, including plans for Weston Hospital and our local medical practice. Providing affordable homes for the next generation remains a major challenge. All of us need to be involved in being vocal about what we value, what we wish to preserve and what changes we wish to see.

I have had the privilege of representing Congresbury on the council for the past 15 years. The next local elections are in a year's time and I feel it will then be time for a younger person to help us shape our future. The Green Party has been a great resource for Congresbury councillors of the past 32 years, but do feel free to get in touch with me if you are interested in representing our village and Puxton, irrespective of party politics.


Congresbury Neighbourhood Plan

You will have read in the local press about the decision by Sajid Javid, the Secretary of State, to refuse the building of 220 houses on the Farleigh Fields site in Backwell. This site had not been identified in the Backwell Neighbourhood Plan for development. Mr. Javid decided to give 'significant weight' to the Neighbourhood Plan despite the fact that North Somerset could not demonstrate that it had a 5 year housing supply. The High Court has also recently given Neighbourhood Plans weight over housing supply.

This demonstrates just how important it is for Congresbury to continue with its own Neighbourhood Plan to ensure that

we get the new houses that we want rather than housing estates foisted on us by building companies who are only interested in making a profit.

A copy of our draft Neighbourhood Plan had been sent to North Somerset to ensure that our recommendations comply with all national and local planning legislation. The next stage involves carrying out consultations with residents over the coming months and if all goes to plan we should be able to hold a referendum in the autumn.



It is very important that as many people as possible are engaged in the consultation. Ongoing information will be provided on the Parish Council website, in the Community Library and in the local press as part of the process and we encourage everyone to actively engage in this consultation.

The vision for Congresbury is:

- that it continues to be a safe and pleasant place to live, and will aspire to achieve a sustainable infrastructure that minimises its carbon footprint.
- any future developments should be appropriate to the existing character and needs of the village.
- the village will remain a place where small businesses can thrive and the residents will continue to benefit from a full range of quality services, amenities and facilities
- Congresbury will continue to be a welcoming. vibrant, independent village surrounded by green fields with a conservation area at its heart.


Congresbury Community Library

Congresbury - Together We'll Make it Happen



The plans for our new village hall and community centre have now been signed off, and can be viewed on the project website. The project is entering a critical

phase over the next few months. Firstly architects Stride Treglown are producing a design package to discharge conditions in the Community Right to Build order, and be sent to local contractors to obtain indicative costings, around June time.

Secondly an invitation will be issued to pledge money towards the build cost. A pledge is a non-binding promise to buy community shares at some point in the future. A full Community share prospectus will be issued later this year. Tax payers buying shares will be eligible for tax incentives, subject to HMRC approval of the scheme.

In the meantime we need to show potential grant funders that the village can raise a significant sum. The target is to receive pledges totalling an optimum of £400,000 with an absolute minimum of £250,000. The invitation will be issued during May and sessions will be arranged for villagers to see the plans and talk to members of the project team.

We have been selected to be one of three projects to receive a grant from the Tesco Bags of Help Grant Scheme. Voting in the Tesco Express (if you use the self -service tills you will have to ask for tokens) and Clevedon stores will take place during May and June. The grant will be used towards setting up regular community café sessions as part of our fundraising activities.

Other fundraising events coming up include:

- Saturday 12th May 2018 Sponsored Abseil at Sandford Quarry. We have arranged a sponsored abseiling event with Mendip Outdoor Pursuits from 10am-12.30pm and all you need to do is pay a £12 registration fee (refundable when you raise at least £50 in sponsorship).

National Grid - New Pylons

National Grid and Western Power Distribution are due to start work soon within our area.

National Grid is building a new high voltage electricity connection between Bridgwater and Seabank which will enable it to link new sources of power in the area, including Hinkley Point. This will involve replacing the present pylons to the west of the village with new Tpylons.

Western Power is going to make modifications to the substation at Churchill. This involves expanding the present site and connecting it to an existing 132,000 volt overhead cable to the east of the site. The work on the new substation is due to start in June and is expected to take 20 months to complete. The timescale for upgrading the substation is:

- Excavation and foundation work June to August
- Installation of electrical equipment Autumn/Winter 2018
- Landscaping and Planting Autumn/Winter 2018

The work on connecting the Overhead Cable starts in Spring 2019 and is expected to be completed later that year.

The Parish Council has been assured by Western Power that the impact on the village will be minimal. All the lorries removing excess soil and bringing in equipment will be accessing the site via the A38 at Churchill/Langford. Also Iwood Lane will be closed to traffic for a short period of time.



National Grid is carrying out extensive tree planting schemes. One scheme involves replacing trees and hedgerows that have been removed during the work. In addition, National Grid would like to hear from landowners with land within 3 km of the pylon route who would be interested in having trees planted on their land to landscape the area along the electricity route.
