### Snippets from your Ward Councillor

Mendip Vale Medical Practice has been much on our minds. The temporary closure of the Congresbury

surgery without consultation must ring alarm bells, especially as we know that the 'temporary' closure of Weston A&E at night started in July 2017. Plans for the new site at Smallway proved controversial in both Congresbury and Yatton. Both parish councils are rightly anxious to guard the 'strategic gap' between the villages. However, I believe it is the right location. The advantages of a modern primary care clinic serving Claverham, Cleeve, Congresbury and Yatton outweigh the harm. At the same time, it is absolutely essential that we must have a safe light controlled pedestrian crossing and improvement to pedestrian access to the proposed site. The final decision is due on the 12<sup>th</sup> December.

Cobthorn Way development work started with undergrounding of power lines, following further archaeological surveys. Details of 'Reserved Matters', including the mix of housing, are yet to be approved before building can proceed. At Mill Lane, St. Congar's Way, seven new dwellings are being built as there was no interest in developing the site for work units.

Local Plan 2036 'Issues & Options' – the three months' consultation will end at midday on 10 December. There are choices for planning with major implications for our village. To respond, visit: <a href="https://www.n-somerset.gov.uk/localplan2036">www.n-somerset.gov.uk/localplan2036</a>.

**Budget** considerations are well on the way. Looking back eight years, the Council's net budget was roughly the same as now (around £150m). Since then, we had to absorb 25% inflation costs and a drop in government support grant from £50m to around £5m. Cost of care for vulnerable adults and children took up 51% of the budget then, now it is 60%. This is why services are being cut despite rises in Council Tax.

### Neighbourhood Development Plan

Firstly could I thank all the residents who either came to the Open Meetings and/or completed the feedback forms. The Neighbourhood Planning Group has read all your comments and amended the Plan accordingly. A table of the comments received and the Group's responses will appear as an appendix in the completed Plan.

The Neighbourhood Planning Group is preparing the Basic Conditions Statement which will demonstrate that the policies proposed are in line with the National Planning Policy Framework and Local Planning Policies.

The Plan will be passed to North Somerset Council to undertake its own 6 week consultation. When the Council approves the Plan it will be sent to an independent Inspector. Once approved by the Inspector a referendum will be held when you will have the opportunity to vote on the Plan.

I would like to thank the residents who have helped prepare the Plan, especially Tom Leimdorfer, Ray Clarke, Dawn Harrison, Peter Hughes, Graham and Sue Lovesey, Stuart Sampson and Liz Greaves.

Local Elections, 2 May, vote for a new District Councillor and Councillors for your Parish Council.

Congresbury Parish Council can have up to 12 councillors who are elected to serve for 4 years. Would you be interested in joining the Parish Council, helping to decide what happens in our community?

To stand for election to become a parish councillor you must be:

- at least 18 years old on the day of your nomination, and
- a British citizen or an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any other member state of the EU.

You must also meet at least one of the following four qualifications:

- You are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector for the parish in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards.
- You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.
- Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the parish area.
- You have lived in the parish area or within three miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.

### **Bristol Airport**

It was agreed that the village, although not directly on the boundary of the airport, was affected by the airport flight paths and the Parish Council can have a representative on the Environmental Effects Committee.

Thank you to all residents who have complained to Bristol Airport about aircraft noise during the year. As the airport expands the number of flights passing over the village will also increase. ### Millennium Green and Community Orchard

As 2018 draws to a close some significant changes will be taking place on the Millennium Green.

S106 money has been spent on new equipment for the children's playground whilst the active climbing equipment will be removed from its current position and re-sited nearby. Once removed, the trees, which this equipment is attached too, will have to be felled as a recent inspection found that the bolts and bands which hold everything in place have buried themselves into the tree trunks, compromising their safety.

You will no doubt have noticed that the tepee has lost its top; this was as a result of age and, sadly, vandalism.

In the Community Orchard three Congresbury Beauty apple trees have recently been planted. The Trustees would like to thank Chris Day, Ashley Brookes and Rod Stephens for all their help in clearing and preparing the site and I'm sure we will toast these new additions to our orchard at the Wassail on 12th January 2019.

## £10,000 Boost for New Village Hall Plans

Plans for the new village hall/community centre at the King George V Playing Fields have been boosted by a £10,000 grant.

The funding comes from Power to Change, an independent charitable trust endowed with £150 million from the Big Lottery Fund to support and develop community business for charitable purposes.

The money will allow the project team to develop the community share offer and the business plan for the proposed new building.

The fund-raising team is also negotiating to secure an equity investment from the Community Shares

Booster Programme. Under this programme, up to £100,000 is available to match applications for shares from the public.

If successful, it would mean that for every pound invested by individuals up to £100,000, another pound will be invested in matched shares.

Additionally the pledge total has reached more than £137,000 from over 200 pledges. A couple have pledged £150,000, but they will only put their money in when the community raises £250,000 when the share offer opens.

The project team will be working on the share offer over the next few months.
