#### Parish Council News

The past 18 months have been difficult for everyone and have provided challenges for the Parish Council in the ways of working and supporting the community. The Parish Council worked together with Love Congresbury and North Somerset Council initially spending time and resources providing support to the most vulnerable in the parish. Love Congresbury continues with this vital work and many thanks to those who continue to support the food bank.

Members of Parish Council staff have continued to work from the Parish Office and from home to provide vital services. Very quicky, due to change in legislation, Parish Council meetings switched to being held virtually via Zoom and through sub-committees we have responded to North Somerset Council consultations and continued to respond to planning applications. The legislation which made this possible was not extended and from 7th May 2021 all meetings of local councils, their committees, sub committees or any other meeting must be held as a physical, face to face meeting. With the lifting of most legal restrictions to control COVID-19 we have now restarted our physical meetings in the Old School Rooms on Station Road where members of the public are welcome to attend.



The Parish Council has had a few changes of members with several resigning their posts and also we welcomed new members.

Parish Councillors are volunteers and give up their time to positively make a difference by influencing decisions that affect your community.

Our District Councillor has also changed and we welcome Mr Phil Neve who is the newly-elected Councillor for Congresbury and Puxton ward following the election on 22nd July. The Parish Council is a member of the Parish Councils Airport Association and has written a statement of objection with regard to Bristol Airport's planning application 18/P/5118/OUT. The Airport appealed North Somerset Council's decision to refuse to grant planning permission for expansion,. The appeal will be determined by public inquiry starting on 20 July 2021 and scheduled for 40 sitting days. This will be held at the Town Hall, New Council Chamber (Old Town Hall Entrance), Walliscote Road, Weston-super-Mare, BS23 1UJ.

The Parish Council is reviewing the policies and Community Actions outlined in the Neighbourhood Development Plan. A request has already been submitted to North Somerset Council for 20 mph zones in the village to improve the environment and safety on village roads. Such zones create places where the priority for the use of the highway is on the needs of pedestrians, cyclists and public transport users, and not just vehicular movements. An improvement for parking on Broad Street with the inclusion of a disabled bay will hopefully be implemented in the Autumn.

Other priorities have included supporting the enhancement of village footpaths and green spaces through grants. Our green spaces have been greatly used and the Parish Council continues to provide essential financial support to the Millennium Green and Cadbury Hill. We are also looking at ways to work closely with Yatton and Congresbury Wildlife Action Group (YACWAG) in the management of the new Cobthorn Way reserve.

Anti-social behaviour continues to be a concern in some areas of the village which has lead to a multiagency approach to create possible solutions. Litter has been a major problem across the country but it is a big issue around the village. The Parish Council does employ an orderly but the amount of litter has exceeded capacity for working hours. We understand that many residents carry out litter-picking and we thank all those who do this. Also, a big thanks to all the volunteers who do make Congresbury a very special place including the volunteers who have ensured the Community Library has provided a service. This was initially, Click and Collect, but, the library is now open 3 times a week and also open Saturday mornings during August. Also, thanks to the volunteers who look after the Geoffrey Peacock Memorial Garden at the traffic lights which is looking stunning and a welcome addition to the village.

## Spring Farm Silver Street

To introduce myself, my name is Mark Edwards and together with my wife Shelly we own and run Spring Farm in Silver Street, Congresbury.



We are both proud to say we are Congresbury born and bred. We produce 50 calves and 500 lambs each year from our herd of pedigree Limousin cows and our flock of sheep. They are raised to the highest standards on our

grass based system. Our mantra is, 'the more we do for the animals the more they will do for us'. All the stock are sold through Sedgemoor Auction Centre to local butchers and other farmers.



Outside my farming business I am privileged to hold the position of Chairman of the North Somerset Agricultural Society. We are a charity whose remit is to develop agricultural understanding by communicating with the public. We achieve this by

holding events such as the North Somerset Show in May and our Ploughing Match and Craft Fair in September. The proceeds of these events are used to fund our biannual Countryside Day when 2500 local schoolchildren come to the showground for a free day of learning how food is produced.

Small events have started this summer on the Bathing Ponds Showground, Wraxall with Field Fayres. These are market stalls selling local produce and crafts and each fayre has a different main attraction. These will be followed by a Ploughing and Hedging match on September 5th and also the Family Countryside Day on

Saturday September 18th. This will be a ticketed event where there will be demonstrations of farming practices, rural crafts and lots of hands-on activities. ## Broadstones playing fields

Congresbury has been very fortunate to have its own playing fields since 1935. Donald Harvey who lived at the Woodlands, Wrington Road donated the King George V Playing Fields to the National Playing Field Association (now called Fields in Trust) which is still the home of both the Cricket and Tennis Clubs as well as the children's play area.

As the population of the village started to increase in the 1950's and 1960's it became apparent that more sport fields were needed.

In 1985 the opportunity to purchase the Broadstone fields was taken up by the Parish Council. These are 2.87 hectares and large enough to create both a full size football pitch, a smaller practice field and a second cricket pitch. Turning a field that had been used for farming into a sports field was a major project. Over the centuries the fields on Dolmoor were raised forming a series of humps, the dip in the middle being called 'gripes'. This was the earliest form of land drainage and allowed the fields to be used for longer periods during wet weather. But, having humps across the pitches was not an option for playing football and cricket. Undeterred by the major challenges the Parish Council drained the land, levelled the two fields and reseeded the land with grass suitable for football and cricket. There was insufficient money to provide new changing rooms, but Messrs Elliotts, who manufactured mobile classrooms in Mill Leg, donated a second-hand former classroom building to the clubs.

By 1997, the timber changing rooms were deemed unfit and new changing rooms were planned. John Churnside, who had been a professional footballer, was Chairman of the Football Club and well-connected with the Football Association (FA) who gave a substantial grant towards the cost. With another generous donation from Joe Urch, who also lived at the Woodlands, it was possible to build the current changing rooms and car park in 2000.



The new changing rooms were officially opened by Arthur Milton who was the last man to have played both Cricket and Football for England.

Although the Cricket Club no longer use

the second pitch, the Football club continues to use the facilities and hope to increase their teams in the coming years. The land is still owned by the Parish Council. With the Millennium Green, the KGV Playing Fields and Broadstones, Congresbury has around 12 hectares of amenity land which is well above the minimum standards recommended by Sport England and the Fields in Trust for the size of our village. However, there may well come a time when more sports fields are needed.

## Congresbury Residents Action Group

Congresbury's action group CRAG, having successfully campaigned against unsustainable development in the village for seven years, is preparing to fight another wave of speculative projects.

With planning reform on the government agenda, many commentators see the proposals as a green light for developers. Prime Minister Johnson wants: "Radical reform unlike anything we have seen since the Second World War."

The Council for the Protection of Rural England's chief executive Crispin Truman said that, 'the fact that some of our most highly-prized areas of countryside are being lost to build more executive homes says a great deal about our planning system'. Under the cloak of providing more homes, the government appears to want to free developers from the strictures of the current planning system and CRAG is well aware that developers have land in Congresbury on their radar.
